American Red Cross Responds to Edinburg Fire

Edinburg, IL: The American Red Cross Illinois Capital Area Chapter responded to a house fire today (Sunday) at 1990 700 East Road in Edinburg that displaced 4 individuals.

Red Cross caseworkers met with affected individuals to identify their immediate needs resulting from the fire. Assistance with food, clothing, shelter and medications was provided.

Every year, between the months of November and March (the months commonly referred to as “Fire Season”) the American Red Cross responds to roughly half of its responses for the entire year. Typically, these responses are to single-family fires. To date this year, the chapter has assisted nearly 40 percent more individuals than at this point last year.

Fire safety tips for the home:

- Install smoke alarms inside and outside each sleeping area, right outside the kitchen, and on every level of your home.
- Test smoke alarms once a month by pushing the test button on each alarm. If it does not work, replace the battery and test again. If it still does not work, replace the alarm.
- Replace the battery in all smoke alarms at least once a year.
- Replace smoke alarms that are 10 or more years old.
- Draw a floor plan for each level of your home. Pick two ways out of each room. Practice escaping from each room twice a year.
- Plug only one plug into each electric outlet.
- Run extension cords only on top of floors and carpets-not under them.
- Have the heating system checked by a professional once a year to make sure it is in proper working order.
- Have chimney(s) and flue(s) inspected once a year by a professional and cleaned as recommended.
- Use flashlights for emergency lighting if you lose power. Do not use candles.

On average, the Red Cross, Illinois Capital Area Chapter responds to a disaster every three days. Last year alone responding to more than 115 disaster incidents, including 104 house fires, 2 incidents of flooding, 1 winter storm, 1 windstorm, 1 transportation accident, and 6 other incidents, providing emergency assistance to 534 individuals.
